BURGUM STRESSES FLOOD PROTECTION AS ESSENTIAL FOR FARGO, MINOT Gov. Doug Burgum on Tuesday emphasized the importance of timely completion

Gov. Doug Burgum on Tuesday emphasized the importance of timely completion of flood protection projects for the Fargo and Minot areas during an update from top regional U.S. Army Corps of Engineers officials at the Capitol in Bismarck. Maj. Gen. Richard Kaiser, commander of the Corps of Engineers' Mississippi Valley Division; Col. Sam Calkins, commander of the St. Paul District; and other officials from the Corps of Engineers and State Water Commission briefed the governor on the status of the Fargo-Moorhead Area Diversion Project and Mouse River Enhanced Flood Protection Project in Minot. The F-M Diversion Board of Authority submitted a new permit application for the diversion project in March after accepting the recommendations of the F<u>-M Area Flood Diversion Task</u> <u>Force</u> formed by Burgum and Minnesota Gov. Mark Dayton. In late March, Lt. Gov. Brent Sanford joined Minot area officials to <u>break ground</u> on the first three phases of the Mouse River project.

Smarter Communities Learning Lab. Sanford, a former Watford City mayor and city commissioner, highlighted his experiences and work to manage explosive growth and the challenges that accompanied it. and community resources of the town, something Sanford advised attendees to implement in their communities. Smart, efficient infrastructure is a key tenent of the Main Street Initiative, one of the administration's <u>Five Strategic Initiatives</u>.

STARK COUNTY ROLLS OUT PROJECT STAND UP



Lt. Gov. Sanford was in Dickinson on Thursday for the launch of Project Stand Up, a national drug crime and school violence prevention program. Through the program, Stark County residents will be able to assist county and city law enforcement officials with investigations by anonymously texting DRUGS to 82257. Project Stand Up was launched in South Dakota last year, and more than 500 investigations have been initiated by anonymous tips so far. Stark County is the first county in North Dakota to participate in the program. Later that day, Sanford helped recognize the winners of the North Dakota Petroleum Council's annual Bakken Rocks CookFest near New Town.
